Washington State Veterinarian's Regulations

All out-of-state goats showing at the Fair must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection except for Idaho and Oregon goats traveling into Washington with their owners in personal vehicles for roundtrip visits of not more than 96 hours provided that fair management provides veterinary inspection on arrival and rejects any unhealthy animals (**this exception does not apply to Market Animals**). This exemption does not apply during emergency disease conditions declared by the State Veterinarian or extend to any required testing. Out of State rams also require an entry permit number. Idaho and Oregon goats staying longer than 96 hours must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. All goats must have official scrapie identification. Health Certificates will not be required for animals that originate in the State of Washington. If lactating goats are entering, their milk must be discarded during any stay in Washington unless they have been tested for Brucellosis, Tuberculosis, and Q Fever. The Out-of-State exhibitor's permit number for the 2011 Fair is 91-WA5717. Your veterinarian need not call the Washington State Department of Agriculture if they use this permit number on health certificates. A new number will be issued each year. No animal from a quarantined area or premises may be permitted to enter the Fair. The Fair Veterinarian **MUST AND WILL** reject any animal with infectious or a contagious diseases or ectoparasites including, but not limited to, ringworm, warts, pinkeye, strangles, contagious ecthyma, scabies, lice, mites, ticks and fleas. Animals exhibiting disease symptoms during the course of the Fair will be rejected by the Fair veterinarian and removed from the exhibit area. The Fair veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal will be final and be upheld by Fair Management. Exhibitors needing veterinary services will call their own veterinarian at their own expense.

GOAT DEPARTMENT INFORMATION

COMPLETING ENTRY FORMS: Entries will be limited to a first-come / first-served basis should the Fair run out of room to house the animals. All exhibitors must use entry form found at the conclusion of the book and they must be postmarked on or before August 9, to Fair Entries, 404 N Havana Street Ste 1, Spokane Valley WA 99202-4663. Particular care should be given in the preparation of all entry forms. Full and correct information must be given. Please list affiliated club / group on entry form for housing purposes. Staff will be available in Bay 2 from 4:00 to 7:00 p.m. on August 9 to assist you with your entry form if needed. If housing remains, late youth entries will be accepted with entry fees doubled. Late entries will not be accepted from Open Class. Horned goats are NOT allowed with the exception of Boer, Pygmy and Angora breeds. No refund of entry or camping fees will be made.

ARRIVING AT THE FAIR: Please take animals to the livestock gate on Broadway Avenue for check-in. The Goat Superintendent and/or fair veterinarian will make the initial inspections for entry into the Fair. The Fair veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal will be final and will be upheld by the SCF&EC Advisory Board and Fair Management. Only animals competing at the Fair will be allowed to be penned on the grounds. Animal exhibits will not be allowed on the grounds until the arrival time as listed prior. Please contact the Superintendent if you are unable to arrive during designated times. Exhibits arriving, with prior Superintendent approval, outside of check-in hours as stated in their respective departments will need to adhere to current Fair and Expo Center policy including, but not limited to, quarantine, until inspected by the Fair Veterinarian and/or Superintendent. Animals will be unloaded and put into assigned pen and can only be removed for stall cleaning, exercising, and showing. Animals may be taken to designated areas only. The Superintendent shall assign pens to exhibitors and such decisions will be final. Stall cards must be displayed at each pen in order to receive prize money. Hay will be available for sale on the grounds. Grain shall be furnished by the exhibitor and must be in a sealed container. The Fair will furnish bedding. Fresh bedding / shavings will be available in bins or areas near the buildings where exhibits are located. Bedding / shavings will NOT be delivered to each exhibitor's stalling area. Bedding must be completed prior to 9:00 a.m. Fans in the barn are permitted.

PASSES (OPEN): Exhibitors with one to three exhibits will be issued one livestock exhibitor pass allowing them six entrances to the Fair to care for their animals. Additional passes will be allotted for each additional three animal entries with a maximum of five per family / group. A person must have an exhibit on the grounds prior to receiving gate admission passes as well as a validated vehicle parking pass from the Livestock Office. Open exhibitors may not purchase Attendant Passes.

PASSES (YOUTH): Exhibitor will be issued a punch pass for the \$5.00 entry fee allowing the youth exhibitor entrance into the Fair to care for their animal. At the same time, parents or guardians may purchase a \$15.00 attendant pass (as of entry deadline). Attendant passes will be \$20.00 after entry deadline. Attendant passes will be limited to a maximum of two per youth exhibitor. A person must have an animal on the grounds prior to receiving passes from the Livestock Office.

SHOWING AT THE FAIR: This year's judges will be Peter Snyder (Open Dairy) and Annette Maze (Boer and Youth Goats). Show schedules will be posted conspicuously and they will run in the order listed. Deviations from the order may occur due to facility accommodation, however all changes will be communicated in advance (appeal to the judge may be available due to cause). When class is called, it is exhibitor's responsibility to be ready to show. An animal that is not physically fit shall NOT be shown or displayed. At the discretion of the General Livestock Superintendent or Department Superintendent, an exhibit can be excluded from showing if that animal is not fitted or properly prepared for the Fair. Exhibitors entered into the Interstate Fair are required to maintain a level of conduct compatible with the Show Ring Ethics. Violation of Show Ring Ethics and/or violation of Department Rules shall, at the discretion of the Superintendent, forfeit exhibitor's prize money and/or forfeit continued eligibility in Fair competition. Persons found in violation shall be required to immediately leave the barn with their animal(s) and return any / all Fair passes, day tickets, or other competition issued coupons / tickets. The Fair will not be responsible for injury to persons or any property damaged as a result of showing livestock. Exhibitors using unusual / visible animal restraint devices must obtain approval of the Livestock Superintendent. Exhibitor must post a written explanation for the restraint device. Each animal shall be placed according to the decision of the judge and such placing shall be final. Anyone interfering with a judge will forfeit the right of prize money. Any protest regarding the judging shall be made in writing and must be accompanied by a \$25 deposit. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be filed with the Fair Office within 24 hours after the cause of the protest. If the Fair sustains the appeal, the fee will be refunded. The Fair reserves the right to cancel or combine classes as needed, as well as substitute judges. If there is no competition in a class for two years, the class may be dropped. Non-market animals may be used in the FFA Livestock Judging Contest on September 12 beginning at 10:00 a.m.

SHOWING AT THE FAIR (Additional Youth Information): Youth exhibitors must not be under 6 years of age or over 18 years of age as of 01/01/11. Blue ribbon winners will not be eligible for open class competition in 2011. Purebred, registered, and recorded goats must have papers. Crossbreeds and grades do not need papers. Awards in all classes will be made on a point system, listed for each class of exhibit. The money per point will be the same for all exhibits and will be calculated by dividing all prize money by the total points awarded. Residents of childcare institutions who have livestock projects will be permitted to show animals they are caring for. Registration papers may be in the name of the institution or club. Youth entries must be a bonafide project and a certificate stating same must be available. Grooming and showing grades completed are as of 2010. Seniors (9th through 12th Grade completed) will show first followed by Intermediates (6th through 8th Grade completed), Juniors (3rd through 5th Grade completed), then Novices (Kindergarten through 2nd Grade).

FURTHER INFORMATION: The following information is provided to further clarify.

- **Grooming and Showing:** Open to youth exhibitors only. In order to compete in grooming and showing animal must be shown in breed class or market class. Your entry must be included on your goat entry form under the correct class and lot numbers. White clothing is recommended for the Dairy Goat Competition. Long hair must be tied back or kept out of the way. Grooming and Showing will be judged on handling, knowledge, exhibitor, and animal. The purpose of the contest is to create more interest in and better knowledge of proper grooming, training and showing animals. All training and preparation of the animals, both prior to and during the show, is to be done by the contestants. Each contestant must show their own animal.
- **Round Robin:** Open to youth exhibitors only. The contest will be held Sunday, September 11, at 2:00 p.m. The top showman from the Goat, Beef, Dairy, Sheep, and Swine Departments will be automatically entered in the Round Robin Showmanship contest. All contestants will enter the ring with his animal and proceed to show it for three to five minutes then move on to the next animal and show it for the allotted time. This will continue until each contestant has shown each type of animal.
- **Team Grooming:** Open to youth exhibitors only. The contest will be held Friday, September 9, at 5:00 p.m. Teams will be two or three kids per team. Youth must pre-enter on original entry form. Please provide your partner's name on the entry form. If you want to be part of this contest but do not have a partner, please list "no partner" in the space provided and we will try to put you with a partner. Goat must be a dry yearling doe. Youth must provide own clippers and their own goat. If you do not have your own goat or clippers please contact the Superintendent prior to September 1 to see if arrangements can be made. Goat should be one that is entered in breed classes. If you do not have a dry yearling entered in breed classes, arrangements may be made to bring in a goat for the contest. Goats should be

brought with hooves already trimmed. There will be no hoof trimming during the contest. It is recommended that goats be washed prior to the contest. Goats that do not appear to need clipped will be disqualified at the Superintendent's / Judge's discretion. Each team will be given 30 minutes to groom their goat. After 15 minutes you will be asked to change groomers so that each youth does some of the clipping. Only one pair of clippers per team can be running at one time. Goats may be clipped while standing on tarp provided. No milk stands or clipping stands. Teams will be divided as follows (same ages for Grooming and Showing apply): Seniors followed by Intermediates, Juniors and then Novice. Grades completed are as of 2011. Novice teams will be allowed one adult to help hold the goat. This adult will be allowed to point and give verbal advice but cannot touch the clippers. Younger youth may be part of an older team. These age classes are subject to change if at least two entries per age class are not received. Winners will receive ribbons for 1st through 5th place and participation ribbons. First place winners in each age class will receive special awards that have been donated. Each member of the top three teams in each class will receive extra points towards prize money.

PRIZE MONEY: Each animal may compete for one prize money award and may be entered in one class or lot, except in the case of herds, get of sire, best three females, three generations, or produce of dam. Individual animals shown in group classes must have been entered and shown in the proper single classes preceding the groups. Exhibitors may make two entries and receive up to two cash awards in any one lot. Only one entry per exhibitor is permitted in group lots. Only animals listed in the Exhibitor's Guide will be accepted for prize money award. For prize money, judge may or may not award all placings according to their discretion. Classes may be split (at the superintendent's discretion) if there are MORE than 12 animals in the class. Awards will be based on judges' records. Ribbons and tags shall not be considered proof for payment of prize money awards. Prize money will be forfeited by exhibitors failing to adhere to the release times printed in the Exhibitor's Guide (with the exception of a vet's order or Superintendent's approval) and by those failing to feed their animals. Prize money will be forfeited by youth exhibitors failing to clean their pens prior to 7:00 p.m. on release day. Market goats shall grade good or better to receive cash prize money awards. Prize money checks for Open Goats may be picked up at the Livestock Office immediately prior to exhibit release. Prize money checks for Youth Goats may be picked up at the Fair Office between October 17 and 31 (Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.). Checks remaining after October 31 and/or checks not cashed by November 30 will become forfeited and considered a donation to the SCF&EC. To clarify, the checks will not be considered "abandoned" property under Chapter 63.29 RCW, but will be a donation by the payee to the SCF&EC. Prize money checks will NOT be issued or re-issued after November 30. If you are unable to pick up your prize money check, you may mail the office a self addressed, stamped envelope with a request for us to mail your check. Prize money will be paid according to the following:

SPECIAL AWARDS

Open Dairy Goats – The Interstate Fair will award the Supreme Champion Doe will receive a special award from the Interstate Fair. The Grand Champion Junior Doe and Senior Doe as well as the Reserve Champion Junior Doe and Senior Doe will each receive a rosette. A banner will be awarded to the Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor. Wildrose Dairy Goat Breeders have donated cash awards for Best Senior and Junior Does in Show, Best Udder, and Best Dairy Herd. These awards will be presented at the Exhibitor Potluck on Saturday.

Goats with official Dairy Goat Herd Improvement Association Production Records – to qualify for the 25% extra prize money offered by the Fair for Advanced Registry does, the doe must be currently on DHIR test and have met the AR requirements in the previous or current lactation.

Open Boer Goats – The Interstate Fair will award the Supreme Champion Boer Goat a special plaque. A banner will be awarded to the Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor. The Grand Champion Junior Doe and Senior Doe as well as the Reserve Champion Junior Doe and Senior Doe will each receive a special rosette.

Youth Dairy Goats – The Interstate Fair will award a rosette and trophy to the Grand Champion Junior and Senior Doe (overall). The Reserve Junior and Senior Doe (overall) will each receive a rosette. Best Udder and Best Junior and Senior Doe of Show will each receive a rosette and trophy. Cash awards have been donated by the Interstate Dairy Goat Producers for Best Junior Doe in Show, Best Senior Doe in Show, Best Udder, and Overall Showman. A trophy and rosette will be awarded to the top showman in each age class and overall showman.

Youth Meat Goats – A cash award has been donated by Ober D' Rainbow Caprines for the top market goat owned and bred by the exhibitor. Cash awards have been donated by The Oregon Meat Goat Producers for the youth meat show for Best Senior Doe in Show, Best Junior Doe in Show, Best Market Goat, and Overall Showman. A trophy and rosette will be awarded to the Grand Champion Junior and Senior Doe. A rosette will be awarded to the Reserve Champion Junior and Senior Doe. A trophy and rosette will be awarded to the top showman in each class and overall showman.

SUPERINTENDENTS: Superintendent shall be in full charge of the department to which assigned and shall administer all policies pertaining to the respective department. Superintendent shall have charge of the entries, judge's sheets, and award sheets and shall be responsible for their being filled out correctly and returned to the Livestock Office. Superintendent has authority to discharge exhibits not meeting quality standards. Any protest regarding the duties of Superintendents, MUST be made to the General Livestock Superintendent.

SANCTION INFORMATION: The open dairy goat show is sanctioned by American Dairy Goat Association (ADGA). ADGA rules shall govern. This is a separately sanctioned show for both senior does and junior does. Entries will be limited to 2 animals per lot per ADGA ID number. Recorded grade goats may be shown in open class. Each breed represented shall have a minimum of 10 entries to compete for placings in their classes. Any individual shown in group classes must be shown in age classification. If there are fewer than ten animals in a particular breed that breed will be moved to the "All Other Purebreds" class. Goats entered in the Open Class must be registered in the name of the person submitting the entry form. Animals must have been owned or leased by the Exhibitor prior to entry deadline (leased goats will only be allowed if the lease is recorded with the ADGA). Proof of ownership or stamped copy of ADGA lease agreement (dated prior to the entry deadline) must be produced when papers are checked.

The open Boer goat show is sanctioned by the United States Boer Goat Association (USBGA). USBGA rules shall govern. This is a separately sanctioned show for senior does, yearlings, and junior does in both fullblood/purebred and percentage goat classes. Entries will be limited to two animals per lot per USBGA ID Number. Each breed represented shall have a minimum of 10 entries to compete for placings in their classes. Any individual shown in group classes must be shown in age classification. If there are fewer than ten animals in a particular breed, that breed will be moved to the "All Other Purebreds" class. Goats entered in the Open Class must be registered in the name of the person submitting the entry form. Animals must have been owned or leased by the Exhibitor prior to entry deadline (leased goats will only be allowed if the lease is recorded with the USBGA). Proof of ownership or stamped copy of USBGA lease agreement (dated prior to the entry deadline) must be produced when papers are checked.

MARKET SALE: The 2011 sale order is Beef, Poultry, Rabbits, Swine, Sheep then Goats. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitor to see that goats are weighed, tagged and penned according to the exhibit schedule. Exhibitor will also be responsible to take their own animal through the sale and an exhibitor dress code will be enforced. The Livestock Superintendent or their designate is authorized to weigh livestock for any market classes. All goats must be ear tagged with a tamper proof State or Federal Scrapies tag. All goats must be trimmed. The buyers of these animals have requested that they not be clipped too short. We recommend that you clip them with nothing shorter than a #5 blade. Goats must weigh between 60 pounds and 100 pounds. Animals weighing more than 100 pounds will be listed in the sale catalog and sold as weighing 100 pounds. Only one single goat may be entered in this lot. No white ribbon animals will be allowed to sell in the market sale. Market goats must be born after 01/01/11. Livestock sold at other shows / fairs cannot be entered into the Spokane County Interstate Fair. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to obtain supporters / buyers for the auction as well as provide names of processors for the buyers. All Market Auction livestock will remain on the grounds until 6:00 a.m., Tuesday, September 13. Exhibitors are responsible to return their goats to their pens following the sale. The exhibitor is responsible to feed and water their animal until Monday, September 12 at 9:30 p.m. Exhibitors are responsible for loading their goats out of the barn on September 13 (6:00 a.m.). All market animal exhibitors will be required to fill out a quality assurance form prior to sale. Animals arriving without a completed QAF and W9 will not be permitted to weigh in. Out of State Animals arriving without a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection will not be permitted to unload. Market Sale checks will be issued separately from the Fair prize money checks. Market Sale Checks – Lost checks or those needing reissued will have applicable bank fees deducted from check amount prior to reissuing. Animals will be sold on Fair scale weight. A two percent (2%) "shrink" will be deducted from the sale price for the general auction fund. Exhibitors are reminded to present themselves and their animal at the sale in a professional manner. Exhibitors are to look like they are going into the show ring for a Fitting and Showing class. Animals need to be fitted. To assist in determining "professional", the following Dress Code will be enforced.

DRESS CODE: Shirts must be tucked into pants / trousers. Long-sleeved shirts are preferred. Sleeveless tops, tank tops, and halter tops will not be permitted. Jeans with holes are not permitted. No off or faded colors. Shorts will not be permitted. Open-toed shoes will not be permitted. Boots must be worn inside the pant leg. Shined boots are preferred. If hair is past chin length it must be neatly tied back away from the face in a braid or pony tail.

COSTUME CLASS: This contest is open to all youth. Contestants must be exhibiting livestock at the Fair. Animal and exhibitor should be in coordinating costume. Ribbons given in lieu of prize money awards. Do not use decorations that would frighten other animals. One lot only per contestant. This event is open to large and small animals combined. Contestants must pre-enter on the livestock entry form and return to the Fair Office prior to the official entry deadline. Entry form should read Department NNZ, Class 13. Lots are as follows: 1–Most Patriotic, 2 – Most Comical, 3 – Most Unusual / Original, 4 – Most Colorful, 5 – Nursery / Storybook, or 6 – Fair Theme. The contest will be held at 1:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 11. Please check with the Livestock Office for actual location of contest prior to Noon on Sunday.

ADDITIONAL FAIR INFORMATION: The east parking lot is only accessible with an appropriate parking pass. No person will be permitted to distribute advertising matter upon the grounds except from their place of business or exhibit space. No person shall distribute advertising matter upon the grounds, including, "For Sale" signs without Superintendent Approval. A "For Sale" bulletin board will be centrally located within each building / department for exhibitor use. The distribution of handbills, fliers, and heralds will not, under any circumstances, be permitted. Anyone violating this rule is subject to fine or expulsion from the grounds. Begging, soliciting, singing, and/or public speaking are prohibited. All concession space will be sold by the management and application must be made in writing. Under no circumstances will anyone be permitted to operate a concession without a signed agreement. 24-hour

guard service is provided during the Fair. The Fair will use every precaution for safe preservation of livestock on exhibit, but will not be responsible for loss or damage. Spokane County Sheriff supervises police protection. Spokane Valley Fire Department supervises fire protection. Only seeing-eye dogs or dogs participating in an approved demonstration or commercial booth will be allowed on the grounds. Service animals trained for a specific service to aid the person they are accompanying will be allowed on the grounds. Companion animals will not be permitted. Smoking in the buildings and barns is prohibited. Alcoholic beverages are prohibited on the grounds except in the Beer Garden. To prevent the possibility of E-Coli, exhibitors are asked to not eat food in the barns. Exhibitors may not sleep in exhibit areas. The Spokane County Fair & Expo Center strictly adheres to Public Law 102-346 regarding animal protection. Copies of this law are available in the Fair Office and will be posted in appropriate places on the grounds. It is your responsibility to know and obey this law.

SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit prize money, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada. The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events.

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of the Fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.
If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. All treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian any time after an animal arrives on the Fair premises.
5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Assn of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

HERDSMANSHIP CONTEST

The purposes of the Interstate Fair's Herdsmanship Contest are to educate the public on livestock and encourage exhibitors to care for animals, pens and equipment. The Fair revised the Herdsmanship Program in 2007 asking exhibitors to put an extra emphasis on educating the public through posters and/or creative displays. Exhibitors must receive a minimum cumulative score of 80% or better to be eligible to receive herdsmanship awards. Scores will be posted daily in each department.

1. In order to be eligible for Herdsmanship, exhibitor's must have the following -
 - a. Educational Display or Poster.
 - b. Stall / Coop Card displayed for each animal.
 - c. Animal must be shown in a class and not at the Fair for display only.
 - d. Clubs / Chapters must also have a banner displayed in their area.
2. All work is to be completed by the exhibitor. Judges will be instructed to disqualify entries if adults are completing the work for youth exhibitors with the exception of Friday and Monday prior to 4:00 p.m.
3. Displays are to be in place by 10:00 a.m. the morning after each department has arrived at the Fair. Signs, curtains, banners and any other decorations or displays should be attached securely to the stalls or supports but not in a manner that might pose a threat of injury to the animal occupying the area, such as wire ends or anything else protruding into the pen / stall / cage. Displays should not interrupt the smooth operation of the stall door rollers, pen gates, or cage doors.
4. Banners and cash prizes (\$25.00 first / \$15 second / \$10 third) will be given to the highest total for each Adult Division in each species. Banners and cash prizes (175 points first / 100 points second / 75 points third) will be given to the highest total for each Youth Division in each species.
5. Herdsmanship Awards will give given in each department in the following divisions -
 - a. Youth Individual (Depts. FF / FFB competing together) - offered to youth exhibitors that are not part of a club / chapter.
 - b. Youth Club / Chapter (Depts. FF / FFB competing together) - offered only during the first weekend of the Fair to those exhibitors representing their club or chapter and that are penned / caged in the same area sharing decorations, banners, etc. Clubs and Chapters must include ALL of the exhibitors in their group showing animals.
 - c. Open (Depts. F / FB competing together) - Less than 5 animals of a species.
 - d. Open (Depts. F / FB competing together) - Five or more animals of a species.
6. Should any questions arise regarding judging, exhibitors and/or superintendents must direct their comments / concerns to the Fair Coordinator, Jessie McLaughlin.
7. Judging will occur twice daily. *If exhibitors are present during the judging and can answer a bonus question given by the judge, they will receive up to 10 additional points. The criteria is as follows:

10 points	Housing - Stalls / Pens / Cages
10 points	Housing - Aisles
5 points	Housing - Tack and Equipment
10 points	Animals - Clean
10 points	Animals - Food and Water
5 points	Animals - Content / Happy
5 points	Overall Appearance - Organization

5 points	Overall Appearance - Decorations
15 points	Education - Overall Display
15 points	Education - Accurate Information
5 points	Education - Incorporates Fair Theme
100 points	TOTAL SCORE*

- ✓ Exhibitors are asked to leave their pets at home. If pets must accompany an exhibitor, they must remain in the camping area, must be on a secure leash if tied outside, and the exhibitor must pick up after them.
- ✓ Those camping at the Fair and Expo Center are encouraged to bring a 100' extension cord with them.
- ✓ Sites may not be occupied prior to 8:00 a.m. on Thursday, September 8, 2011.
- ✓ Only persons having exhibits in the Fair between Sept. 9 and Sept. 14 can use sites during that period.
- ✓ Persons not exhibiting in the Fair during the second half of the Fair shall remove their RVs or tents prior to Noon on Wednesday, September 14.
- ✓ Spaces for second half exhibitors will be available by 2:00 p.m.
- ✓ Upon arrival at the Fair, please check in at the Livestock Gate and you will be directed to your camping space.
- ✓ Camping permits must be displayed on your camping vehicle. Place the permit on inside lower left corner of windshield or on the tent side nearest the access road.
- ✓ Camping fee of \$20.00 per night must accompany permit and must be received by the Fair between July 1 and August 9. Sites will be assigned based upon the date the payment is received. Sites in the campground will be assigned first to those staying all ten days of the Fair.

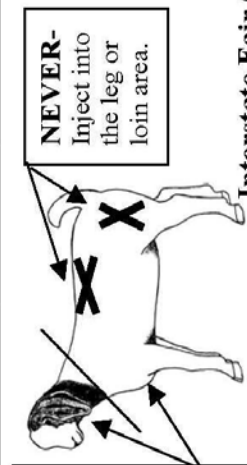
