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Introduction

Purpose

The purpose of this Annual Report is to provide the Spokane community an accounting of the costs, actions and outcomes of its Juvenile Court.

In early 2005, as a proactive response to reduce overcrowding in the secure detention center, Spokane County Juvenile Court began exploring cost effective alternatives that would achieve public safety, youth accountability and rehabilitation. The use of a comprehensive, structured reform effort offered community collaboration in the review of research based models and evidence based programs in choosing strategies to correct deficiencies within our department, detention facility and programs. Our reform efforts include the following objectives:

- ❖ Collaboration
- ❖ Use of accurate data
- ❖ Objective admissions criteria and instruments
- ❖ Alternatives to detection
- ❖ Case processing reforms
- ❖ Reducing the use of secure confinement for “special cases”
- ❖ Deliberate commitment to reduce racial disparities
- ❖ Improving conditions of confinement

Additional priorities for the department are:

- ❖ To increase attention and resources for abused and neglected children, as well as at-risk youth to prevent progression into criminal behavior.
- ❖ To continue the recruitment, training, and retention of dedicated volunteers to provide services to children and families.
- ❖ To provide quality services and evidenced based programs to children and families served by the Juvenile Court that promote accountability, skill building, public safety and rehabilitation.

Units of Operation



Administration: Director and Business Office

Director

Responsible for personnel, budget development, program direction, policy formation and department representation.

Business Office

Provides various department-wide functions including: personnel services, budget preparation and related work, purchasing, accounts payable, accounts receivable, fixed assets and payroll.

Handles low level, first time offenders by meeting with and assigning conditions to referred youth as an alternative to the formal court process. Monitors performance of youth, provides or refers youth to services, and responds with action where needed. Screens, trains, supervises, assigns cases to, provides direction to and evaluates Neighborhood Accountability Board members (NAB Volunteers).

Court Investigation

Conducts social investigations, assesses level of risk to the community, and presents detention and sentencing recommendations to the Superior Court Judge and Court Commissioners assigned to the Juvenile Court.

Supervises low to high-risk juvenile offenders; conducts a risk- assessment and develops case plans which address: public safety, offender accountability and rehabilitation. Utilizes evidenced based programming and practices to decrease youth risk factors and increase protective factors.

Detention Alternative Programs

Programming for court ordered youth that hold youth accountable for their actions in lieu of detention:

Community Service

For youth who have been ordered hours to complete and/or are in contempt of their Probation, At-Risk Youth, Truancy and Diversion conditions. Youth serve the community at non-profit agencies and special projects in the community.

SAC - Structured Alternative Confinement

A facility onsite which provides structured education, G.E.D. preparation and job skills training. Some SAC students may also be confined in the Electronic Monitoring Program.

Weekend Program

For youth in contempt of their At-Risk-Youth and Truancy petitions. This Saturday program consists of a three-hour class followed by three hours of community service.

Girls Group

A weekly guided group for girls in violation of their court ordered conditions to discuss gender related issues.



Confinement

EM - Electronic Monitoring

EM is an alternative and less costly form of confinement. Through EM equipment and the Probation Counselor's field work, the youth's home becomes their "detention center."

Maximum Security

Provides 24-hour confinement, direct supervision, and security of the highest risk youth. The major objectives of confinement are **community safety, youth accountability, and positive change.**

Support Staff

Provide essential support services, data collection, and reporting to all units of operation, enabling them to complete their objectives in an efficient manner and ensuring compliance with rules and regulations. These services include providing Juvenile referral processing, records maintenance and disclosure services, Juvenile record sealing and destruction services, participation in local and statewide systems development committees, reception area assistance, ordering supplies, and maintaining equipment.

Director


Under the Authority of Superior Court Judges, directs all administrative and program activities of the Juvenile Court Department.



Business Office

- ❖ Handles all fiscal work of the department for 93 employees, follows County policies and procedures and prepares all budgets requested by management.
- ❖ Prepares monthly budget analysis for Probation and Detention Managers.
- ❖ Completes payroll, maintains leave accrual records, prepares personnel action paperwork and processes purchase orders, accounts payable and accounts receivable.
- ❖ Prepares and maintains vendor, state and federal contracts compliance.




Unpaid Staff

Staff Costs vs. Operational Costs




90% of expenditures are directed to staff salaries and benefits.

10% covers the costs of maintenance and operation which includes counseling or other rehabilitation or treatment efforts not provided by Juvenile Court Staff.


Juvenile Court Expenditures

Other sources include funding such as local, state and federal grants.


Total Expenditures for Administration, Probation & Confinement Divisions




44.86% of the total dollars coming into the department are allocated to Confinement, 50.12% to the Probation Division and 5.02% to Administration.

Volunteer Programs



Spokane County Juvenile Court believes volunteers are essential for the effective implementation of our programs. It is recognized their skills and abilities benefit the court, the family, and the community. Volunteers make direct contributions to staff effectiveness, provide families with intensive direct services, and through their added awareness of juvenile issues, benefit the community at large.

Neighborhood Accountability Board

Diversion involves the handling of minor juvenile offenders within the community as an alternative to the formal Juvenile Court system.

Neighborhood Accountability Board volunteers work as two-person teams under established guidelines to determine the most appropriate disposition for a case. Based on the team’s decision, a legally binding Diversion Agreement is voluntarily entered into by the youth. Volunteers are asked to commit to the program for one year.

Court Appointed Special Advocate Guardian Ad Litem


When a petition has been filed alleging that a child has been abused or neglected, the Juvenile Court is required to appoint an individual to serve as a Court Appointed Special Advocate/Guardian Ad Litem. (CASA/GAL).

The role of the Guardian Ad Litem is to represent the best interest of the child by making independent observations of the child’s situation and submitting a written report to the Court.

Guardians Ad Litem initially spend approximately 15 - 25 hours over a five-week period

preparing each case for the first hearing. After that, they must appear at court hearings, monitor the court order to ensure it is being followed and continue to work in the best interest of the child. CASA/GAL's are asked to commit themselves to the child for whom they are advocating while the case is in Juvenile Court, usually a minimum of 18-months.

NAB and CASA Volunteers (Participation)



Detention Volunteers

The Juvenile Detention Center provides short-term care and secure custody pending court hearings to juvenile offenders who meet confinement criteria or are ordered by the Court to spend time in confinement. The youth range in offense from those being detained for violations of court orders to those who have been charged with serious felony offenses. Detention volunteers function under staff supervision and involve detained youth in constructive activities by providing direction as well as positive interaction. These volunteers are usually involved anywhere from two to eight hours per week. Activities they provide include, but are not limited to: visiting youth not having parental visitors, religious services, Interns providing assistance to the Electronic Monitoring Program, etc.

Detention Visitation Program

The Detention Visitation Program provides visitors from diverse cultural backgrounds as positive adult role models for youths. Many youth are never visited by family members. These adult visitors come during family visitation times to interact with youth not being visited by their families. This lets the youth know members of our community care about them during their incarceration. A six month commitment is requested of these volunteers.

Electronic Monitor Program—Service Learning Opportunity

College students needing to fill a Service Learning requirement for course credit may volunteer in our Electronic Monitoring Program. Students learn about the Electronic Monitoring equipment and Program as well as providing additional youth tracking services.


Dependency / CASA (Non-criminal)

The Dependency proceedings include coordination and overseeing the legal and social processing of abused, neglected and/or dependent children as mandated by state and federal laws. The Dependency process aids abused and neglected children to either be reunited with their families or find an alternative safe, permanent home.

Judicial Officers, Assistant Public Defenders, CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate) and staff, employed by Juvenile Court, are involved in Dependency proceedings as well as state social workers, Assistant Attorneys General and private counsel.

The filing of a Dependency Petition starts the process in Juvenile Court. Subsequently there may be a Shelter Care Hearing followed by a Fact Finding and Disposition Hearing, where it is determined whether or not the child will become a dependent of the state. Dependency Reviews are held routinely, at least every six months.

Dependency Activities



The CASA Program: recruits, trains, supervises, and coordinates CASA volunteers. CASAs make recommendations, provide testimony and speak for the best interest of abused and neglected children both in judicial and non-judicial Dependency forums.

Dependency / CASA

A CASA is the “eyes and ears” of the judge.

The CASA will:

- ❖ Complete an intensive investigation into the factors surrounding the filing of the dependency petitions alleging abuse and neglect of children;
- ❖ Interview the child, parents, Department of Social and Health Services social workers, psychologists, physicians, therapists, criminal justice personnel, foster parents and other professionals who may have had contact with the family;
- ❖ Be sensitive to the value systems of people from other cultures and backgrounds than their own, and the policies of public service agencies;
- ❖ Assess the information obtained;
- ❖ Write a thorough but succinct report, and make recommendations concerning the child's placement, services for all family members, and other specific recommendations required by law;
- ❖ Provide oral testimony as needed by the Superior Court Judge;
- ❖ Monitor the orders of the court.



Becca (Non-Criminal)

The “Becca Bill,” passed by state legislature in 1995, was designed for parents to gain assistance from the courts to support their at-risk teenagers. The youths involved are often using or abusing substances, chronically run from the home, present mental health concerns, or are involved in other activities which directly endanger themselves or others. Parents, children, courts, law enforcement and DCFS can use this legislation to respond to family conflicts and assist families in crisis management and reconciliation.

The Becca Bill consists of three petitions:

At Risk Youth (ARY):

Through this process parents may petition the court for assistance with their teen while the teen resides in their home. Court orders mandate the youth attend school, remain at home, abstain from all drug/alcohol use, follow a curfew, and potentially a list of other case by case directives. For a child to meet the requirements of an ARY petition they must meet at least one of three criteria:

- ❖ An individual who is under 18 and remains absent from the home for a period of more than 72 hours without parental consent; or
- ❖ Is beyond parental control such that behavior endangers the health, safety or welfare of the child or another person; or

- ❖ Has a serious substance abuse problem.

Child in Need of Services (CHINS):

The purpose of a CHINS petition is to temporarily place a child outside of the home in an attempt to repair family relationships and ensure child safety. This temporary placement is only able to last 9 months and the petitioning party must provide a placement. CHINS petitions can be filed by a parent, youth, or DSHS. Under a CHINS petition, the parent and the child are required to attend counseling which includes family and individual counseling. Visitation between the parents and child occurs, along with a host of other possible services, to seek family reconciliation at the end of the 9 month period.

Truancy (TRU):


School officials are mandated to file a truancy petition if a youth had seven unexcused absences in a month or ten in one year. These petitions require the youth to attend school every day, every period, on time and can also hold the parent responsible for chronic truancy.

In all BECCA petitions the parties may be held in contempt of court for violating the court order which may include sanctions determined by the court.

Role of the BECCA Case Manager:


- ❖ Refer families to mandated and optional services.
- ❖ Work with school, treatment, and law enforcement officials to monitor youth and provide wrap-around services.
- ❖ Monitor court order compliance and make recommendations to the court for sanctions and modifications.
- ❖ Obtain information from collaborating agencies to inform the court.
- ❖ Conduct home visits, school visits, and treatment facility visits.



Number of Male/Female Youth Referred





Ethnicity of Spokane County—Data Source— 2015 US Census Bureau

(Based on 2015 US Census Bureau)




Ethnic Background of Youth Referred




Offenses Received




Referrals by Type of Offense






Offenses Filed in Each Classification



Offenses Found Guilty at Trial & Offenses Pled Guilty




Diversion

Diversion is a program designed to keep juveniles who are charged with a first or second minor criminal offense out of the formal court process. The juvenile and parents meet with a Juvenile Court Neighborhood Accountability Board volunteer, supervised by a Probation Counselor. The divertees sign a Diversion Agreement which is a contract between the juvenile and the Juvenile Court Diversion Unit. A Diversion Agreement is not a conviction; the record is not available to the public and can be both sealed and destroyed. The agreement/contract may require the juvenile to complete one or more of the following conditions:

- ❖ Attend counseling/education classes
- ❖ Perform community service
- ❖ Pay restitution and fines
- ❖ Attend school and observe home curfews


There are currently 40+ volunteers who dedicate a total of approximately 2,404 hours each year to meet with and monitor diversion youth.

Offenses Referred to Diversion Unit




The Diversion Unit processes nearly half of all offenses referred to Juvenile Court. Offenses Signed reflect the total offenses with Diversion Contracts.

Number of Contracts Completed by Diversion Youth




Cases are left open until all conditions of the agreement are completed, up to six months. Cases are left open for restitution for up to twelve months.

Restitution Dollars Paid by Diversion Youth




Restitution fluctuates annually depending on the amount of loss to victims and the amount ordered in a given year.

Court Investigation

The Court Investigation Unit is the first contact youths have with Juvenile Court Probation when they are detained for a new offense or charged by the Prosecutor for criminal behavior.


Probation Counselors conduct investigations and appear at detention hearings to advise the court whether or not a youth is a threat to community safety and requires continued detention including electronic monitoring or if they can be returned home on court ordered conditions.

If a youth pleads guilty to the charge in Juvenile Court, the Probation Counselor conducts a social investigation in the areas of current living arrangements, family history, social skills, attitudes and behaviors, school, drug and alcohol use, mental health, use of free time, aggression and employment history.


A validated Pre-screen Risk Assessment is completed by the Probation Counselor and at a Disposition (sentencing) Hearing a recommendation is made to the Judge. Since Washington State has determinant sentencing, most youth receive up to one year of supervision, up to 150 hours of community service work, and other conditions that include counseling, curfew, school attendance and no contact orders. Following disposition of the case most youth are assigned to the Community Supervision Unit based on the Risk Assessment score.

In the event a youth has an extensive criminal history or the offense is very serious, the youth may be committed to Juvenile Rehabilitation and serve time in a state institution. In some instances of serious violent crime, Juvenile Court may decline jurisdiction and they may be transferred to the adult system for prosecution.

Number of Hearings



A Declination Hearing determines if a juvenile should be transferred to adult court.

Detention Hearings determine if a youth should be released home, held in detention, or placed on electronic monitoring pending a finding of guilt or innocence. Youth can also stipulate to release or confinement.

Disposition Hearings are hearings where youths are either placed on Community Supervision or committed to a State Institution to address: community protection, accountability and rehabilitation.

Probation/Community Supervision

A Probation Counselor monitors juvenile offenders in our community to ensure they are complying with the terms and conditions of the Court Order. Probation Counselors identify protective and risk factors by administering a statewide standardized Risk Assessment*. They then develop a case plan with the youth and facilitate participation in evidence-based programs. These intervention programs are proven to reduce recidivism. They include the following:

Functional Family Therapy (FFT): a structured family-based intervention focusing on the strengths of the family.

Aggression Replacement Training (ART): a program for youth who are assessed to be moderate to high risk for re-offense and have had struggles with aggression control and/or lack of skills in pro-social functioning.


Coordination of Services (COS): A collaborative community resource program offered to low risk juveniles and their parents which identifies links to future criminal behavior and educates them on available community resources.

Probation Counselors also collaborate with other community agencies, including schools, in order to reduce risk factors, strengthen protective factors, and ensure compliance with the court ordered conditions. Juvenile Court contracts with various agencies in the community to provide individual counseling, sex offender treatment, drug and alcohol treatment, etc.


Violations of probation are handled using a variety of graduated sanctions that include community service work, attendance at a skill building programs, electronic monitoring, and secure detention.

*The Risk Assessment identifies risk factors in the lives of juvenile offenders which directly correlate to likelihood to re-offend: low, moderate, high, as well as strengths of youth.

Number of Youth on Probation




Probation Violations



There were 530 probation violations from among the 416 youths on probation in 2016. This represents multiple violations of probation by some youths and no violations of probation by other youths. Court ordered probation may include:

- ❖ Mandatory school attendance
- ❖ Community service work
- ❖ Curfew
- ❖ Not to use or possess dangerous weapons
- ❖ Counseling and education programs
- ❖ Drug and alcohol evaluation/treatment, urinalysis
- ❖ No association with co-defendants
- ❖ Geographical restrictions
- ❖ Restitution payments to victims
- ❖ Court fees
- ❖ Notify Probation Officer of current address and report to Probation Officer as required


Days Sanctioned for Probation Violators



Confinement / (EM) Electronic Monitoring


Electronic Monitoring (EM) is a cost effective form of confinement where youth are closely monitored at home and in the community by electronic GPS equipment and Court Probation Counselors.

After a thorough risk assessment, youth are confined to home with required releases for school, counseling, employment and community service work. The GPS allows the Probation Counselors to view the exact movement and location of the offender while on a release. Probation Counselors work in EM seven days a week and are on call 24 hours a day. Violations are dealt with immediately and may result in the youth being transported to the Maximum Security Detention facility. Running away, failing to attend or return from a required release may result in felony escape charges.



EM helps reduce detention overcrowding, leaving incarceration space for youth who may be a danger to the community. EM provides accountability while allowing youth to connect positively to the community, and their family by keeping them in school and counseling.

Youth in Electronic Monitoring Program



(SAC) Structured Alternative Confinement

The SAC Program, begun in October 1995, provides swift intervention, accountability and confinement to pre and post adjudicated youth. Court ordered sanctions can now be imposed immediately. There is no longer a delay in confinement or early releases from Detention due to overcrowding. There are four primary components to the Structured Alternative Confinement Program:

Electronic Monitoring

Youth ordered to the SAC program may also be confined on the monitor. Failure to successfully participate in all aspects of the program results in detention.

School

Youth attend a secondary education program from 8:00 am to 12:45 pm, Monday - Friday, focusing on skills which enhance the students' ability to transition back to their home school. There is also a GED program in the afternoons, Monday - Thursday. SAC School complies with the Washington State's Essential Academic Learning Requirements.



Community Service

Youth who have court ordered community service hours, work each afternoon and Saturdays at over 30 non-profit sites throughout Spokane County.




These include Community Centers, parks and food banks.

Basic employment skills training are routinely included in classroom instruction.


Youth in SAC Program



Community Service

Community Service is a sentencing condition requiring juveniles to complete court ordered work at non-profit sites such as neighborhood centers and food banks. Juveniles demonstrate responsibility and accountability as they are placed at work sites where they can actively participate in a positive manner. Creating roles where they can contribute to their communities, fostering healthy working relationships, learning skills and completing court ordered hours are goals for each referred youth.

Community Service Hours Completed




Note: These are hours completed by BECCA, Diversion, and Probation youth under the supervision of a DAP Probation Counselor.

Detention Alternative Programs (DAP)

Spokane County Juvenile Court has established various alternative programs to assist in youth accountability while better identifying and addressing the needs of the youth and families.


Evening Reporting Program

The Evening Reporting Program (ERP) was developed in the fall of 2005 in accordance with the Juvenile Detention Alternative Initiative (JDAI). This program is designed as a detention alternative for youth who are in violation of their probation court order. The Evening Reporting Program holds youth accountable for their actions through effective programming in lieu of confinement in secure detention. Youth participate in needs identification, skill building exercises and positive forms of recreation and communication. ERP ended in May 2016.



Weekend Program

The Weekend Program was developed in the fall of 2004 as a detention alternative for the Truant and At-Risk Youth population. Youth are court ordered to the Weekend Program when they are in contempt of an active court order. This program focuses on accountability, skill building, community service and other needs that may be identified.




Girls Group

Girl’s Group was developed in 2006. It is an alternative to detention for young Truant and At-Risk females under the jurisdiction of Juvenile Court who are in violation of a court order. It addresses girl-specific issues in a supportive, strength-based atmosphere while promoting responsible behavior and compliance with the court order.

Detention Facility


The Detention Facility has 39 single cells where juveniles are held after arrest, while awaiting trial or when serving up to a 30-day sentence. Juveniles are in a structured setting, and are provided daily skills based programs to encourage positive change in their lives. Educational School District 101 operates the Detention School.

Average Daily Population (ADP) of Youth in Detention




