


Instructions Marking Your Ballot



Completely fill in the oval to the left of your choice.


Vote for only one candidate in each contest.

Use a dark blue or black pen.

Unless specifically allowed by law, more than one vote for a contest will be an overvote and no votes for that ballot contest will be counted.

To vote for a candidate whose name is not printed on the ballot, write the name on the line provided and fill in the oval.

Correcting Your Ballot



If you make a correction or mismark your ballot, draw a line through the entire response. You then have the option of making another choice.

In order for your ballot to be counted, it must be either postmarked or deposited at a designated deposit site no later than 8:00 p.m. on Election Day (November 6, 2018).

Fire Protection Service Excess Levy

The Rockford Town Council enacted Resolution 18-04 concerning a proposition to finance 2019 fire protection services. This proposition would authorize the Town to levy an excess property tax in 2019 on all taxable property within the Town of Rockford at an approximate rate of \$.51 per \$1,000 of assessed value to raise \$14,800 to be used to provide adequate services in 2019. This levy replaces an expired levy, which the Town has collected in past years. Should this proposition be approved?

The Spangle Town Council enacted Ordinance No. 430 concerning a proposition to finance the 2019 fire protection services. This proposition would authorize the Town to levy an excess property tax in 2019 on all taxable property within the Town of Spangle in an approximate rate of \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed value to raise \$23,000 to be used to provide adequate fire protection services in 2019. The Spangle Town Council enacted Ordinance No. 431 concerning a proposition to finance the 2019 Police Protection Services. This proposition would authorize the Town to levy an excess property tax in 2019 on all taxable property within the Town of Spangle in an approximate rate of \$1.19 per \$1,000 of assessed value to raise \$17,000.00 to be used to provide adequate police protection services in 2019. Spokane Public Library General Obligation Bonds

The City Council of the City of Spokane passed a resolution approving a plan to finance the acquisition, construction, remodel and equipping of the City's public library system. Resolution No. 2018-0069 authorizes modernization of the Downtown, South Hill and Indian Trail branches; expansion and modernization of the Shadle branch; remodel or relocation of the Hillyard branch; construction of new Liberty Park and Libby Center branches; installation of library kiosks throughout the City; equipping and outfitting the branches; issuing up to \$77,000,000 in general obligation bonds repaid from an annual excess levy on real property, maturing within 25 years from date of issue. The Spokane City Council approved Resolution No. 2018-0071, authorizing an advisory vote be submitted to the voters regarding whether the Spokane Public Schools' proposed stadium should be either (A) located at the present site of Albi Stadium or (B) located at a central location on property owned by the Public Facilities District (PFD) on the North Bank of the Spokane River. Shall the Spokane Public Schools' proposed stadium be either:

- B) located on property owned by the PFD on the North Bank of the Spokane River.

Bonds to Construct New Schools and Replace and Renovate Aging School Facilities

The Board of Directors of Spokane School District No. 81 adopted Resolution No. 2018-10, concerning a proposition to relieve overcrowding and improve educational opportunities. This proposition would authorize the District to: construct 3 new middle schools serving Northeast, Northwest and Southside; replace or renovate Glover, Sacajawea, Shaw, On Track Academy and Albi Stadium; renovate Libby; construct commons/cafeteria at Lewis and Clark; acquire land; make District-wide safety, technology and other smaller improvements; issue no more than \$495,300,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 20 years; and levy annual excess property taxes to repay the bonds, all as provided in Resolution No. 2018-10. Voter Service Centers will be open on election day only from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Voters may drop off ballots; get replacement ballots; use an Accessible Voting Unit, or receive other assistance as needed on Election Day. For a list of voter service centers please go to spokanecounty.org/elections.

Ballot Drop Box locations are available 20 days prior to Election Day. These are located at public libraries, Town Halls and the STA plaza. For a complete list of locations please go to spokanecounty.org/elections.

In order for your ballot to be counted, it must be either postmarked or deposited at a designated deposit site no later than 8:00 p.m. on November 6, 2018.
