County Parks Snow Removal Operational Guidelines

Spokane County Parks, Recreation & Golf maintains several park properties which are popular for winter recreation including some community and regional parks and several Conservation Futures properties such as Antoine Peak, Mica Peak, Dishman Hills, and the McKenzie Conservation Area on Newman Lake, among others.

Recreationists are encouraged to be prepared for winter driving conditions when heading out to County Parks trailheads in the winter (4WD vehicles and/or traction tires and chains are recommended). While the County Park system remains “open for access” during the off season, park services such as restrooms and garbage removal are generally limited during the winter months.

County Parks monitors snow conditions and freezing temperature elevations and we will schedule efforts to plow trailhead parking areas as time and resources allow. Park properties identified as Priority 1 in the attached matrix are the most likely to receive significant snow accumulations and the most popular for winter recreation such as snow-shoeing. Priority 2 parks are typically lower in elevation or have limited recreational appeal in the winter. Several other parks are NOT scheduled for any snow removal; these are listed below the matrix.

Accumulations of four (4) inches or more at designated sites will generally trigger Park Operations to schedule a visit to the site with snow removal equipment. Snow accumulations which fall over a weekend may not be cleared until the following weekday(s).
