On August 4th, 2020, the annual National Night Out event will be hitting residential areas, parks, apartment complexes and businesses all around Spokane County! Are you ready to have a night of joining your community and neighbors in celebrating giving crime and drugs a going away party? Then turn on your porch lights, lock your doors and step outside to join together with your neighbors, local law enforcement agencies, community leaders, businesses and other first responders for an evening of fun, food and entertainment. This is an event where you and your neighbors take back the night from criminals by getting acquainted with our community by meeting and talking and building camaraderie with your neighbors.

For the last 36 years, the NATW (National Association of Town Watch) has been going strong with thousands of communities all over the United States and Canada encouraging NNO block parties where you can host a crime and drug prevention event. You can host your party with BBQ's, ice cream socials, bands, bounce houses and more. What you plan for your neighborhood is up to you! Once you have decided to have a NNO party on your block, you are encouraged to invite your local first responders and other guests by filling out the NNO registration form on page 6 and then turning it in to SCOPE's and Spokane County Sheriff's Office Neighborhood Watch Coordinator.

Sheriff's corner

A message from Sheriff Ozzie Knezovich



Community Oriented Policing is about being proactive to crimes rather than reacting after the crime has already happened. It's about everyone coming together, which means, the government, law enforcement and neighborhoods to solve ongoing problems within the community. Dealing with issues before they happen and then working to solve the ones that already have is the best way for law enforcement and the Community to work together.

Community Oriented Policing's true bases is crime prevention. Crime prevention works well when people get involved and when the multitude of people come together. For any of that to work, there has to be a partnership, it can't be driven from one side or the other.

For years, the community has looked to law enforcement to solve problems that are not law enforcement based issues. When community oriented policing came into effect in the 1970's, that relationship started changing - law enforcement began focusing on how to get the community involved in solving some of the issues that were going on in the neighborhoods. Law enforcement can't fix all the problems and frankly, even if we could, there is just not enough of us to do so.

As a sheriff, what I have seen is state and national government try to drive problems down to the local level which is not geared to deal with those types of issues, i.e., mental health. Law enforcement is not the end all. If people actually knew how few of us there are, they would rapidly come to the understanding that without the citizens involvement, we cannot be affective. We absolutely need the public's assistance in all aspects including, making sure that everyone picks up the phone to call in crimes and suspicious activities, listening and acting on the messages that are being put out about closing garages, locking car doors and not leaving items out for criminals to take. We also need continued help and support on putting pressure on elected local leaders to properly fund agencies that deal with drug and alcohol addictions as well as developing a better private public relationship with health care providers to help folks to deal with those issues.

At the law enforcement level, we have worked hard to build a partnership where the community and law enforcement will engage. We have taken every effort to reach out and build bridges through HOA's and entire neighborhood groups that are linked into our intelligence sites. When that neighborhood, or that HOA is experiencing a burglary or theft or some other crime wave, we know about it almost instantaneously. We can put proper resources where they need to go. Without community involvement, without that engagement, without community oriented policing, we wouldn't know where to go, or what was going on in your community because no one would be reporting it. For those folks who are too afraid to get in-

involved, to make those calls when they see troubles going on, they will remain afraid because it is going to get worse. If you don't tell us, where the problems are in the neighborhoods we can't come and fix it. If you don't report... nothing is going to be done. You have a choice of being proactive or reactive, or doing nothing at all. Or, you can help us, and we gain the upper hand. Law enforcement can gain the upper hand when the community and the neighborhood stand up and say, were not taking going to take it anymore, were going to fight back. When people get involved and take those action and when law enforcement comes right up beside them, we become their action point. Show law enforcement where the problem is and they can go deal with the problem.

Community Oriented Policing is important. We want to find ways to solve problems before they happen, and we want to get answers to why that crime happened.

It also gives law enforcement an opportunity to realize that not all the public feels the way that media would portray us. So, engage with us, lets continue to communicate with each other, and let's continue to build a partnership.

Community relations



We want the community to help us, we want to have a better relationship with the community. At the Spokane County Sheriff's Office, we are constantly striving to be better. Nationally, in association with our citizens, we have been recognized for our training. We have bias training, anti-bias training and recognition training. And, instead of escalating with someone who is hostile, we have been trained to not only bring that person away from the edge but to maintain a level so that we do not end up escalating with them. We are the only agency in the United States to get certified at the international level, not just national. We train to understand the dynamic of personal, external bias and conflict resolution. We take great pride in the that and in the fact that the training has helped us in our relationship with the public. I believe the only way for law enforcement to be successful through is to have community buy-in, and not just buy-in, we need the communities support. We need the community working side by side with us—the total community, to help us solve the issues that we are facing. Without that, all we are is a bunch of people driving around in cars trying to respond to the next problem. The effectiveness of what we do is the community understanding who we are, what we do, what we can do for them and how we can help them, and how they can help us. Without that dynamic, we will never be successful. Holding and participating in events such as Community Academy, the Crime Prevention Unit's crime prevention conferences, ride-a longs, National Night Out and other events gives us the chance to have that type of discussion, interaction and that type of building a partnership to happen. Again, it gives a chance to be seen as a real feeling human being, not just someone with a badge.

Be informed, stay involved and call when you see something. The safety of our neighborhoods is the responsibility of everyone!

Here is your residential party planning guide! Remember that what you do is up to you! You can spend as little or as much as you would like for your party. Make sure that in your planning that you consider the age range that you will be hosting to so that you can plan appropriate activities and entertainment. Send out flyers and reminders for your party and get RSVP's, and make sure to keep a list of who is bringing what and what is needed and collect the last of the items on your list.

If you are not able to have a party make sure to check out the parties on page 4 and 6 that you can attend.

Residential Party Guide

Party Planning Idea list

If this is your first National Night Out block party, here is a helpful planning guide with helpful tips to get you get started.

Keep it simple and have a potluck, put up a movie screen, or rent a bounce house. Spend as much or as little as you want, how you want to celebrate NNO is really up to you, but one of the most important things is to get your neighbors involved! Don't be afraid to ask for help or donations from your neighbors who would like to attend the event.

- Talk to your neighbors about having a block party. **This is extremely important.** This party is for all on your block to not only attend but to enjoy, so why not get some hands-on help and input. If you plan to invite guests coordinate with your neighbors who you would like to hear from and if you are interested in getting some specific information.
- Find out if anyone has any special skills or has items that they would like to share (backyard pool, large grill, ice cream maker or ice cone maker)
- Ask local businesses to donate to your party; food, to print flyers for your get together or ask for gift certificates. You don't know how much they may help if you don't ask!
- **Theme it up!** Host a party with a theme. • Luau • 50's, 80's or roaring 20's theme • Western themed (red and white plaid table cloths, hay stacks to sit on, lemonade, cowboy hats, boots and shirts, etc.) • Fiesta • Beach party. Don't just dress up add the themed food to go with it.
- Dessert only outing (cookies, make your own sundae, etc.), or have best baked pie or dessert contest
- Have a picnic and have everyone bring a picnic basket of food, and a blanket or lawn chairs to sit on and while you provide fun activities.
- Coordinate something that can be distinct for your neighborhood such as everyone on the block use blue porch lights or dress the house in red, white and blue streamers
- Have a parade and dress up your animals or the kids and adults. Kids can decorate bikes and scooters!
- Water Balloon Fights. Make it extra fun for the kids by adding some food coloring inside the balloons!
- Pie Eating Contest: have each neighbor attending supply a pie, or make whip cream pies for the contestants.
- Talent Show
- Bingo with a twist, make it a surprise giveaway. Have everyone bring something that is a reasonable cost and have a gift table where everything is wrapped or hidden. Whoever gets a bingo wins a gift from the table.
- Scavenger Hunt where you can hide gift bags or a gift basket, or gift cards to find or give to the winner/s.
- Cake Walk. They are fun and easy to do and can be done in a number of ways. You will need some music and a way to mark spots numbers or colors or letters on chairs, grass, sidewalk. You can spray paint numbers on the grass or lay down cut out cardboard with numbers, use washable paint or chalk on the sidewalk, or put out chairs with numbers taped on the back.
- Invite a band to play in your backyard
- Set-up a face painting or coloring station for the kids
- Make it a movie night by putting out a screen or playing the movie on the side of your home. You can add a smore's station, make popcorn.
- Have an evening campout and roast hot dogs and provide a smore's station
- Have a battle of the grills to see who can make the best burgers or the tastiest BBQ sauce
- Have everyone dress up in red, white and blue in honor of National Night Out
- Do something for your community such as organize a community clean-up, donate time to SCRAPs, a food kitchen's or the Union Gospel Mission.
- Exchange items that are not being used with other neighbors or collect items to donate to charity
- Help a neighbor (home that needs painting or yard clean-up).

Party guidelines

Coordinate with your neighbors about coming together for the event, or what you would like to do and let them know that their may be some noise involved the day of the gathering.

- If you do not live on an arterial street you can close the street to traffic HOWEVER, please do not close intersections and do NOT use cars to block off your street.
- Remember that not all neighbors will want to participate, so please be courteous.
- Please allow access for emergency vehicles to enter and exit the block freely.
- Keep tables and other set up on one side of the street to keep street open for residents that need to pass. Please allow them to drive in and out of the area with ease.

The noise ordinance for each area is:

Spokane County and in the City of Spokane Valley: 7:00 AM-10PM

Liberty Lake and Airway Heights: 24 hours a day

Cheney: 24 hours a day. Exemptions to the noise ordinance can be granted upon written application to the Police Chief.

Medical Lake: Gatherings in this area will not permitted until November due to the COVID-19.

- Lastly, for this event, you do not need a permit to have a neighborhood block party. However, NNO out parties in the a park will need to pay \$50.00 for a permit. To receive a permit, please go to; <https://www.spokanecounty.org/1424/Special-Events-Reservations> for your area.






